Partner Profile:

Stop Hunger Now

No matter where you are in the world, there are hungry families. Stop Hunger Now, an organization dedicated to ending hunger in our lifetime by providing food and life-saving aid to the world's most vulnerable populations, is doing something about it and Fluor offices are partnering with them. Fluor volunteers in both South Africa and Houston, Texas worked with the organization to provide more than 85,000 meals to those in need.

In honor of Mandela Day, Fluor South Africa volunteers participated in a special "Meals in Memory" meal-packaging event organized by Stop Hunger Now South Africa. Each meal package feeds six people and contains a nutritious protein mix and a pack of minerals and vitamins specifically formulated to combat malnutrition.

A total of 260 Fluor volunteers, including family, friends and students took part in the meal packing event. Fluor volunteers packaged more than 35,600 meals.

In addition, Fluor South Africa donated a truck to Stop Hunger Now South Africa to assist the organization with distributing meals to people who are located across rough terrain in townships and rural regions.

"We are honored and humbled by Fluor's gracious donation of a delivery vehicle," said Barry Mey, chief executive officer, Stop Hunger Now South Africa. "The truck will be used in meal-packaging events, as well as for food distribution. The new truck will deliver more than 300,000 meals per annum, reaching over 5,000 impoverished communities."

In Houston, 30 teams made up of nearly 350 volunteers from various departments packed more than 50,000 meals for Stop Hunger Now.

A team of Fluor employees flew to Kulun Qi, Inner Mongolia, to maintain the Fluor Forest, part of China's Million Tree Project. The project, which began in 2007, aims to raise community awareness of the environment, while focusing on steps people can take to lessen their negative impact on the natural world. The Fluor volunteer team joined with other companies and schools to help plant more than 1,000 of the 2,000 trees Fluor donated this year. Volunteers also pruned the four-year-old trees planted in the Fluor Forest in 2010 to encourage growth.

In addition to planting, community and education programs are implemented through the program to raise awareness and assist local living standards, ensuring positive impacts and project sustainability.

Since Fluor joined the Million Tree Project in 2010, it has donated more than 12,000 trees.

Gliwice, Poland

In recognition of International Mother Earth Day, Fluor Gliwice organized 'Plant a Tree with Us.' In cooperation with Rudziniec forestry services, 80 Fluor volunteers, including employees, students, and family and friends, planted 5,000 seedlings of Scots Pine to contribute to the environment's natural preservation.

A forest ranger educated the volunteers on how to properly use the tools to plant the seedlings. It was important that the youth were a part of this project, as they will be the generation that will be responsible for preserving the environment. Volunteers covered 0.5 hectares of the forest with trees.

Since the initiation of the tree planting activity three years ago, Fluor Gliwice has planted more than 6,000 new trees.
